OUR MISSION

Parents, Families, and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) promotes the health and well being of Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgendered persons, their families and friends through: support, to cope with an adverse society; education, to enlighten an ill-informed public, and advocacy, to end discrimination and to secure equal civil rights. PFLAG provides opportunity for dialogue about sexual orientation, and acts to create a society that is healthy and respectful of human diversity.

Our meetings are always held on the 3rd Tuesday of each month at the Westwood United Methodist Church, 10497 Wilshire Bl., NE corner of Wilshire and Warner. Take 405 Freeway to Wilshire Bl. East exit. Continue 1.5 miles. The entry on Warner has an elevator; another entry is through the sanctuary to the corridor, then upstairs to the Fellowship Hall - 3rd floor. There is also easy access from the north driveway. Doors open at 6:30 pm.

PFLAG starts each meeting with a rap group where individuals can share their concerns, questions and understanding about and with the gay person or persons in their families. After the rap session, we generally have a speaker or panel of speakers whose topic includes subjects pertinent to the families, gays and lesbians. If needed, a separate group for people wishing to share and learn about people with AIDS (PWAs) is held, along with a Spanish speaking support group facilitated by Spanish speaking parents.

Mark is now a diversity consultant specializing in sexual orientation issues. Mark has developed his own "Sexual Orientation Issues in the Workplace" program. The goal of this program is to help companies eliminate ignorance, fear and discrimination based on sexual orientation. The program is very interactive, using self-guided and facilitated exercises to generate ideas and discussions around workplace issues. Topic areas include identifying workplace issues, legal requirements and company policies, stereotypes and assumptions, and tools for promoting a workplace environment where everyone is treated with dignity and respect. Mark will present an overview of this program, highlighting a few of the exercises he uses.

Excerpt of the speech by Elizabeth Birch, Executive Director, Human Rights Campaign, at the Democratic National Convention

"I am honored to speak here as a gay American. Tonight, we celebrate the American family. But we know that America's family is not yet whole.

For the color of his skin, James Byrd Jr. was dragged behind a truck in Jasper, Texas, until his body was shattered on a drainage ditch. Because of her faith, 14 year old Kristi Beckel was gunned down as she worshipped in a Texas Baptist church. Because Matthew Shepard was gay, he was driven into the countryside on a freezing Wyoming night, beaten and hung on a fence to die. His gentle voice still asks why, as do the families who have paid for our national lesson with their children's lives.

Tonight, we dedicate ourselves to healing the fractures - soothing the wounds - to make our American family truly whole.

I speak here tonight with the parents and political leaders whose action or apathy will determine the fullness of the American family.

To parents - some of whom have left their gay children at the margins of family life and out of a vision for America, I say this: I want you to know that your gay children are gifted and strong. All are heroic in the way they have conquered barriers to their own self-respect. Many have suffered cruelty or violence. Some serve their communities with leadership and grace. Many are rich in faith, and have a deep love for this nation and democracy. Tens of thousands have served with distinction in the armed forces. Many have lost their lives. Many have lost their jobs. All were created by God.

Healing America's family requires resolve, not simply a refrain. Not a single gay American seeks special rights or favored treatment. We seek simple equality - the equal right to work, raise a family, serve our country in every way and be free from the shackles of brutality and hate.

As long as a young man can be left on a fence to die, our American family is fractured; as long as gay parents live in fear that their children might be taken from them, our family is torn; as long as hardworking Americans can be fired in 30 states simply for being gay, our family is not whole; as long as gay people are barred from serving openly and with dignity in the armed forces of the United States, our family is not just; as long as gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender youth are at risk for suicide...until there is a cure for AIDS for men, women and children here and around the world...then the American family we celebrate tonight is not yet healed. It is not enough to love your own children. Leaders must love all children and safeguard the family called America. We don't have a single child to spare...I don't know how our young twins will one day judge my partner Hilary and me as parents, or as people. Our hope and prayer is that we will measure up in the way Dr. Martin Luther King asked people to judge themselves. He said: 'In the end, we will remember not the words of our enemies, but the silence of our friends.'"

The first woman to run for President of the United States, Victoria Woodhull, stood in 1872 on the ticket of popularizing free love.



HABLANDO ENTRE HOMBRES



We've been blessed in recent years with a massive outpouring of movies with

LGBT themes. This reflects the growing strength of our communities as well as interest in the LBGT world by the broader culture. The result has been what now has become a steady stream of pictures. Coming-of-age and coming to terms with one's sexuality are no longer the principal themes of these productions. Two new movies reflect these developments.

AIMEE & JAGUAR is based on the story of a German Jewish woman during the final years of Nazi regime who meets and falls in love with what we might at first glance call a model housewife. The latter is Aryan, married to a Nazi officer, and also the mother of his four sons. The Jewish woman, Felice Schragenheim, performed magnificently by Maria Schrader, is an active and conscious lesbian. She's also a daredevil and thrill-seeker who takes risks others in her circle wouldn't even contemplate. She conceals both her sexuality and her Jewishness to work undercover in a Nazi newspaper. And, she's so effective that she becomes the indispensable right-hand to the editor! Covertly, however, she steals secrets to which he has access and passes them on to the anti-Nazi underground.

The German woman, Lilly Wust, played beautifully by Juliane Koehler, was unhappily married and seems to have had a series of unhappy sexual relationships with men outside her marriage. He's away at the front during much of the movie's time frame. When Lilly and Felice meet, they are drawn to one another, though Lilly doesn't really grasp what's happening. Of course it takes time for them to work this out, but we see their evolving relationship as it goes through its trials and tribulations.

It's a tragic story, as Felice is then ultimately captured by the Nazis and disappears. The narrative is book-ended by images of Lily in the present (in real life, she's still alive) speaking longingly of Felice, who even fifty years later, remains the love of her life. The movie's exquisite use of dark visual tones: browns and blacks, accentuates a foreboding sense of the tragic fate which awaits Felice.

It's a true story, which became both a best-selling book and a widely popular theatrical release. The movie was first shown at OUTFEST last year, along with a documentary of their lives, LOVE STORY, that may be available on video. The book was a bestseller and the movie was a box office hit in Germany. Tragic, beautiful, great!

BUT I'M A CHEERLEADER

PFLAG has been active in the public protests against "Dr." Laura Schlessinger, the anti-gay physiologist whose hectoring "advice" talk radio programs are set to expand to television soon. Ironically this makes BUT I'M A CHEERLEADER most timely. It's a sardonic assault on the idea of "reparative therapy" through which numerous lesbian and gay children have been placed by rigidly heterosexual parents.

Pretty redhead Megan (Natasha Lyonne of THE SLUMS OF BEVERLY HILLS, AMERICAN PIE and IF THESE WALLS COULD TALK II) finds herself disgusted by her boyfriend's sloppy kisses. Her friends and family note the pictures of girls rather than boys in her room and school locker, and they sense things about Megan she doesn't see herself. After all she asks, incredulously, "But I'm a Cheerleader?" To head off the dreaded future the parents' instincts sense, they stage an "intervention" and force Megan into a "residential treatment" facility called True Directions.

This institution, presided over by a ruthless autocrat, and staffed by an amusingly de-dragged RuPaul provides a series of surreal images in which the "presumed normal" forms of gender expression (pink for the girls, blue for the boys) and socialization training (housecleaning for the girls and sports for the boys) are inculcated with a mixture of carrots and sticks. Like a 12-step program, the inmates are forced to attend group therapy, and to "admit" their homosexuality, whether they believe their own words or not. Only then are ready to be set on the narrow and straight path.

Among the involuntary inmates, Megan meets Graham (Clea DuVall), an angry, cynical, cigarette-smoking dyke who knows with certainty who she is. In time she and Megan are drawn to one another and a youthful romance begins. Graham challenges Megan sharply, and helps her figure out who she herself (Megan) is, and that she's in love with Graham. The affection between the two is palpable, and I found it the most credible part of the picture. There's also a lot of cute cross-chatter at times, but much of the humor of the picture is based on tired stereotypes. Most of the rest of the movie was so stereotypically overdrawn as to defeat its laudable purpose.

Critic David Ehrenstein, writing in NEW TIMES LA, noted a "striking parallel to the true love story of Exodus International, an 'ex-gay' ministry whose founder met, fell in love, and abandoned the organization they helped found in order to fight it."

Homosexuality = Unnatural? Think again after reading

by Bruce Bagemihl, Ph.D. ISBN 0-312-19239-8

It lets the reader look into the amazing world of two hundred years' worth of documented homosexual wildlife and gives the reader a broad picture of homosexual behavior in the animal world of baboons, chimpanzees, gibbons, dolphins, whales, seals, deer, giraffes, antelopes, buffalo, elephants, bears, ducks, gulls, and parrots, just to mention a few.

If you thought homosexuality is "unnatural" and man-made as part of a "gay agenda", this book teaches you different!

THE UGLINESS OF HATE CRIMES AND WHAT YOU CAN DO

For 1998 the FBI reported 1,439 crimes motivated by victims' sexual orientation. Since the death of Matthew Shepherd, 37 murders of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people have occurred.

In Los Angeles County, according to the Los Angeles County Commission on Human Relations, lesbians and gay men have consistently been the No. 1 or No. 2 target of hate crimes. Many victims never report the anti-gay, lesbian and transgender harassment or violence they experience for fear of being outed, or being concerned about law enforcement insensitivity.

The Anti-Violence Project of the Los Angeles Gay & Lesbian Center provides a comprehensive range of victim recovery and empowerment services for victims of homophobic, anti-transgender, and anti-HIV/AIDS violence, threats of violence, vandalism, and harassment.
